

A hungry dinosaur threatens to eat Hal and his parents, but Hal verbally defends his family, eventually wrestling the dinosaur into submission. The illustrations resemble a child's crayon drawings increasing the appeal to young viewers.

Starting with his underpants, Little Mouse methodically puts on all of his clothes only to discover he is overdressed. Silly yet charming, this comic book is for "brand new readers." (2010 Theodor Seuss Geisel Honor.)

Farrar/Frances Foster, 2009 \$17.99 Grades 4-7

When the Nazis invaded Poland, Dr. Korczak, his staff, and the children from the "progressive" orphanage he had established traveled from the Warsaw Ghetto to Treblinka. Acrylic illustrations show old Warsaw and make this book understandable, human, and important.

Christensen, Bonnie

Django: World's Greatest Jazz Guitarist

Illus. by the author

Roaring Brook, 2009 \$17.99 Grades 1-4

Christensen's non-fiction picture book tells the little-heard story of jazz guitarist Django Reinhardt. Free verse text and rich oil paintings aptly depict Django's successes and setbacks. Extensive notes, a bibliography, and a discography are included.

The Great and Only Barnum: The Tremendous, Stupendous

Life of Showman P. T. Barnum

Fleming brings the public and private Barnum to life, warts and all, and deepens the value of her writing by placing Barnum's actions and beliefs in historical context, contrasting them with modern day mores.

When Billy Twitters disobeys, his mother follows through on the threat to get him a whale with the impossible task that Billy must care for his pet. Rex's full-color illustrations add humor and depict the hilly streets of San Francisco.

A short, thrilling, and ingenious tale of revenge by a class on their Trunchbullian teacher, brilliantly complemented with funky illustrations. A tongue-in-cheek picture book for older readers about the power of imagination and friendship.

Princess Hyacinth: The Surprising Tale of a Girl Who Floated

Illus. by Lane Smith

Schwartz & Wade, 2009 \$17.99 Grades Pre-2

A whimsical and enchanting fairy tale in which lighter-than-air Princess Hyacinth would like nothing more than to float up like a balloon. Featuring Lane Smith's expressive illustrations, this is sure to be a storytime favorite.

Taylor, Laini

Lips Touch: Three Times

Illus. by Jim Di Bartolo

Arthur A. Levine, 2009 \$17.99 Grades 8–12

This collection of three short stories explores the consequences of a first kiss and the dark longing that can sometimes result. Taylor's richly layered writing develops vivid imagery and intricate worlds, intertwining elements of folklore, Hinduism, Zoroastrianism, and fantasy.

Werlin, Nancy Impossible

The ballad "Scarborough Fair" becomes the foundation for an engaging story that reads like an original fairy tale. Seventeen-year-old Lucy discovers she is one of a long line of women in her family cursed with madness unless she can perform three impossible tasks.

Simon Pulse, 2009 \$18.99 Grades 5-8

An alternate, steampunk take on the events surrounding WW I with a divide between the Clankers, who rely on man-made machines, and the Darwinists, who have aircraft born of genetically combined and modified beasts.

Random, 2009 \$16.99 Grades 4-7

Picking up where the first book, *100 Cupboards* (Random, 2007) leaves off, Henry York lays secret plans to go back into other worlds but is suddenly blinded by a vision of a dandelion in a lightning storm.

This thoroughly authentic depiction of life with Mongolian nomads describes a baby boy's first year of life in the family ger, or little round house, that is re-assembled twice yearly to follow the goats' grazing habitat.

Charles and Emma: The Darwins' Leap of Faith

H. Holt, 2009 \$18.95 Grades 8-12

A biography of Charles Darwin and his wife Emma that reads like a tightly-plotted romantic novel while shedding new light on one of science's most important figures and his work on evolution.

Hoose, Phillip

Claudette Colvin: Twice Toward Justice

Farrar, 2009 \$19.95 Grades 5-10

A heroic, but largely forgotten, teenage trailblazer's life is vividly told using primary sources and a compelling, well-organized narrative. The story adds new context and deepens our understanding of the Civil Rights movement. (2010 Newbery Honor.)

Yellowstone Moran: Painting the American West

Thomas Moran was determined to explore the land called the Yellowstone and capture its beauty in his paintings. Readers will be astounded at the sight of steaming hot springs, massive waterfalls, and the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone.

Sky High: The True Story of Maggie Gee

Illus. by Carl Angel

Tricycle, 2009 \$16.99 Grades 1-5

Maggie Gee, one of only two Chinese-American women who served as an American Women Airforce Service Pilot (WASPS) during WW II, is celebrated with Angel's acrylic paint and colored pencil illustrations and text told from Gee's point of view.

Bad News for Outlaws: The Remarkable Life of Bass Reeves,

Deputy U.S. Marshal

Carolrhoda, 2009 \$17.95 Grades 3-6

The exhilarating adventures of Reeves, a formidable African-American lawman in the real Wild West, leap to life with expressive illustrations and skillful, folksy storytelling. Extensive back matter further details this extraordinary, nearly forgotten hero's years.

Following the death of her childhood friend, Lia, a troubled teen suffering from anorexia and self-mutilation, descends deeper and deeper into her disease. An intense and relentless portrayal of a terrifying illness that affects many of today's teens.

Armstrong, Alan

Looking for Marco Polo

Random, 2009 \$16.99 Grades 5-9

Mark's father, following in the footsteps of Marco Polo in the Gobi Desert, goes missing, so Mark and his mother journey to Venice to find him. Many wonderful characters make history come alive in this engaging tale.

#### Philbrick, Rodman

The Mostly True Adventures of Homer P. Figg

Blue Sky/Scholastic, 2009 \$16.99 Grades 4-8

In this episodic tale reminiscent of Twain's *Huck Finn*, Homer P. Figg gets entangled with grifters, helps a Quaker aiding folks on the Underground Railroad, and witnesses a Civil War battle while looking for his older brother. (2010 Newbery Honor.)

Slayton, Fran Cannon

When the Whistle Blows

Philomel, 2009 \$16.99 Grades 5-9

Growing up with her father's stories of life in the railroad town of Rowlesburg, West Virginia, Slayton creates a historical fiction tribute to the days of the steam engine, her family, change, and approaching adulthood.

Smith, Sherri

Flygirl

Putnam, 2009 \$16.99 Grades 7-10

Ida Mae signs up for pilot training during WW II, even though the WASP (Women's Airforce Service Pilots) bars African-Americans. Her light skin allows her to hide her true identity, but the constant fear of discovery takes a toll.

Stead, Rebecca

When You Reach Me

Random, 2009 \$15.99 Grades 4-8

Miranda, a savvy 6th grader, unravels the clues in this intricately constructed puzzler that leaves readers guessing right up until the end. The book crosses genres seamlessly, moving from realistic fiction to something darker and more mysterious. (2010 Newbery Award.)

Marcelo in the Real World

Arthur A. Levine/Scholastic, 2009 \$17.99 Grades 8-12 Marcelo Sandoval, a 17-year-old boy on the high-functioning end of the autism spectrum, agrees to spend the summer working as a mailroom assistant for his

father's law firm. A fascinating account of how someone with vastly different communication skills forms meaningful relationships in today's complicated world.

Stroud, Jonathan

Heroes of the Valley

Disney/Hyperion, 2009 \$17.99 Grades 5-9

A young man vows to avenge his murdered uncle in an engaging adventure story brimming with action, intrigue, murder, legend, and mystery that borrows heavily from Viking lore.

Set in San Francisco in 1851, this historical adventure focuses on Amelia, who cuts her hair to get a job as a newsboy. Her mother and the mother's female partner earn money by sewing, and the subtle reference to the same sex partnership and Amelia's ethnically diverse friends and acquaintances give this an immediacy without being anachronistic.

Lin, Grace

Where the Mountain Meets the Moon

Little, 2009 \$16.99 Grades 2-5

Living a poor life in the valley of Fruitless Mountain, Minli is enchanted by her father's stories which lead her to waste her money on a goldfish. Thus, an adventure is set in motion which gathers threads of various stories into one amazing strand that eventually leads her home. (2010 Newbery Honor.)

Link, Kelly

Pretty Monsters: Stories

Viking, 2008 \$19.99 Grades 9-12

Ghosts, magic, monsters, blood, and werewolves populate themes of fantasy, horror, and science fiction in Link's first collection of short stories for young adults. Recommended for those who want fantasy and prefer the unusual.

Magoon, Kekla

The Rock and the River

Aladdin, 2009 \$15.99 Grades 7–10

Set in 1968 Chicago, this riveting story is about a young African-American boy's search for identity and brotherhood. Sam is torn between obeying his father, a leader in the non-violent protest movement, and following his older brother who has joined the Black Panthers.

Purple Heart

Balzar & Bray/HarperCollins, 2009 \$16.99 Grades 8-12 A young U.S. soldier in Iraq suffering from traumatic brain injury feels he doesn't deserve a Purple Heart: he is sure he shot an Iraqi boy during action and is complicit in a cover-up.

Barnhouse, Rebecca *The Book of the Maidservant* 

Random, 2009 \$16.99 Grades 5-9

Johanna, a serving girl to a medieval holy woman, is long suffering because her mistress feels only the misery of the Virgin Mary and Christ. On a pilgrimage to Rome the resourceful girl finds a way to be her own person.

Buzbee, Lewis Steinbeck's Ghost

Feiwel, 2008 \$17.95 Grades 5-8

While his parents work to pay for their new house, Travis visits the Salinas Library and helps fight against budget cuts. As John Steinbeck's characters come to life around town, Travis wonders what Steinbeck's ghost is trying to tell him.

After Al Capone gets Moose's autistic sister into a special school, Moose receives a note in his laundry saying, "Your turn." The focus is on family relations, friendship, and budding young love in this follow-up to Newbery Honor-winning *Al Capone Does My Shirts* (Putnam, 2004).

The Girl Who Threw Butterflies

Set during WW I and told via four voices through concrete poems, this quiet but moving novel shows how war affects teenagers in a way that will change them forever.

Scat

Nick and Marta investigate the disappearance of their biology teacher in Hiaasen's latest eco-thriller which combines sympathetic protagonists, obnoxious villains, humor, and a thoughtful subplot involving an Iraqi veteran.

Hyde, Catherine Ryan

The Day I Killed James

Knopf, 2008 \$16.99 Grades 9-11

Set in California's San Simeon area, this transformative story of heartbreak and grief centers around 17-year-old Theresa as she battles overwhelming guilt at the loss of James whose love for her was unrequited.

Kelly, Jacqueline *The Evolution of Calpurnia Tate* 

H. Holt, 2009 \$16.99 Grades 4-7

In 1899 Texas, almost-12-year-old Calpurnia Tate is caught between the growing pressure to acquire housewifely skills and her own scientific interests. Kelly captures the excitement of scientific discovery and provides vivid glimpses into the friction and affection of family life. (2010 Newbery Honor.)
